They distinctly repudiate the idea, declaring emphatically: "We are for instant Emancipation, as the quickest, surest and cheapest mode of making peace an I making it permanent." That the Maryland Concention shall samply insert in its Constitution the following memorable lines of Mr. Jefferson's Ordinance of Freedom: "In Maryland, Slavery and involuntary servitude, otherwise than in punishment for crimes, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted shall be, and is hereby torever prohibited." And as to State compensation, the address is equally explicit, in the following concluding lines: "We are for compensation to loyal owners for property pect. destroyed or taken by the Government of the United States (Slavery included), and we are opposed to a State being made to bear the burden of Emancipation-a policy essential to the satety of the Union."

The language here used is emphatic and unmistakable, aud cannot be regarded as placing the question of Emancipation on any contingency either of State or Government compensation.
