The Surrender of Johnston. [From the Washington Chronical.] We have learned from a gentleman who was present at General Sherman's Headquarters during the proceedings some interesting particulars of Joe Johnston's final surrender.

As soon as General Grant reached the front he caused a despatch to be sent to Johnston, notitying him that the armistice entered into between General Sherman and himself would be terminated in forty-eight hours from the time when the notification passed the picket line.

Later in the day General Sherman telegraphed Johnston a demand that he should surrender his army upon the same terms that were granted to General Lee.

On the next day Johnston telegraphed a request to General Sherman that a copy of the terms proposed on the 18th should be forwarded to him, also asking for a further armistice. Sherman telegraghed on the 25th that he train had broken down, was somewhat delaged.

The surrender then took place, substantially upon the same terms as those accorded by General Grant to Lee. Each officer and man is to that the forces surrendered amount to twenty-
