Admission of Tennessee. The reconstruction of the States lately in rebellion has at length begun. Last week, in the House of Representatives, Mr. Bingham, of Ohio, presented a report from the Joint Committee on Reconstruction, embracing a large bulk of evidence from various sources as to the present condition of Tennessee. The report closes with a resolution, carefully framed, setting forth that the people of that State, by a popular vote, in ratifying their new Constitution, manisested their desire to resume the relations which formerly existed between them and the Union, winding up with the declaration that

Tennessee is entitled to representation in the

National Leigslature. The resolution read as

"Resolved, That whereas, the people of Tennessee have male known to the United States their desire that the Constitutional relations heretolore existing between them and the United Though falsehood triumph and misfortunes low'r, States may be fully established, and that on the 22d day of February, 1865, by a large popular yote, adopted and ratified a constitution of government, republican in form and not inconsistent with the Constitution and laws of the United States, and a State government has been organized under the provisions thereof, which said provisions and the laws passed in pursuance thereof, proclaim and denote loyalty to the Union; and whereas the people of Tennessee are found to be in a condition to exercise the functions of a State within this Union, and can only exercise the same by the consent of the lawmaking power of the United States, therefore the State of Tennessee is hereby declared to be one of the United States of America on an equal looting with the other States, upon the express condition that the people of Tennessee will maintain and enforce in good faith their existing Constitution and laws, excluding those who have been engaged in rebellion against the United States from the exercise of the elective franchise for the respective periods of time therein provided for, and shall exclude the same persons for the like respective periods of time from eligibility of office; and the State of Tennessee shall never assume or pay any debt or obligation contracted or incurred in aid of the late rebellion, nor shall said State ever in any manner claim from the United States, or make any allowance or compensation for slaves emancipa-

Washburn and Boutwell announced their dissent from the measure on the ground that it does not afford sufficient guarantees of hdelity to the Union and of protection to the freedmen. Messrs Rogers and Grider presented a minority report, denying that the State of Tennessee had ever been out of the Union, and directing that her Representatives be immediately sworn in.
