Amount to be paid in all cases, No person is authorized to take or catch oysters for the purpose of selling the same without first taking out license therefor.

No person having a license to take or catch oysters is authorized to permit other persons 19 use his cance or boat for the purpose of taking oysiers, unless such person be a hand or employee of the person so licensed.

Two or more persons can be licensed to use the same canoe, the licenses to be granted separately and the number of each to be painted on the canoe or vessel.
