After all but two had been quietly picked up at the door, Col. Beaumont entered the room. Of these two one was John Campbell, local editor of the Avalanche, and "Grand Cyclops" of the Klan. Campbell drew his pistol on Beaumont, but being told that resistance was useless, as there was a strong force of policemen at the door, he and his companion went quietly along. Shortly after the arrest sixteen of the members publ.shed a card accusing Campbell of having betrayed them, whereupon be responded in another card, exposing enough of the proceedings of the organization to reveal its true character, and promising still further revelations in case it should become necessary to make them. It is sufficient to show the diabolical and murderous purposes of the Klan
