ters where hard fighting has been goine on annual at every corner, sometimes in hideously contorted attitudes and with ghastly gaping wounds, only half hidden by the scrap of cloth, or may be a bit of bough, which some passer by has thrown over them. It is probable that the num. ber of executions was due to the fact that long after the street fighting was over the insurgents kept on firibg from the windows of the houses, and killed a great many of the troops. The soldiers were, in consequence, so exasperated that one of the officers begged myself and iriend not to remain near them, as he could not be answerable for their treatment of anybody whom they found wandering about that locality, and who might not be able to give an account of himself perfectly satisfactory to them. -We were not very loth to act upon the advice, for we were the only two strangers about, and we found ourselves unpleasantly placed between two fires .-Belleville being ready to tear us to pieces as Versallies, and Versallies to shoot us as rebel citizens of Belleville. A more uninviting set of people than scowled at us as we passed from window and doorway I have not often seen, the women worse than the men. Most of them had the halt-scared, halt-savage look of a wild beast cooped up in a cage, who when he hears the crack of the keeper's whip scarcely knows whether to fight or crouch away. The still reeking corpses of their neighbors and triends, and the volleys which told that another execution was going on, tamed most of them .-But some had the courage still to breathe fire and slaughter, and to declare that when night came on a fresh and more terrible vengeance would be wreaked on the troops: I tear that notwithstanding the rigor-to use no harsher word-with which the rebellion is being stamped out, it will be long before Paris is safe from incendiaries and assassins prowling about in the dark, or poisoning in open day. One signt in Belleville was espet cially ghastly and horrible!
