IN—THE NEW PROPHET.

X.—DOCTS AND TEMPTATIONS.

The more Franz reflected upon the strange things that were enacting around him, the greater difficulty he had in uniting himself visibly with the fanatical congregation. The baptismal rite was still unperformed, and he delayed it from day to day, as if he shrank from that final test of a faith upon whose threshold accosting horrors and indecencies were still lurking.

Garibaldi made a speech which was of so violent a character that it excited a tumult in the Chamber. He defended his comrades in arms, and said the formation of three divisions of volunteers, as decreed, was not sufficient for the national armament.

Bixio made a conciliatory speech and Count Cavour and he accepted the words of conciliation.
