Taking Leare .- Yesterday afternoon Judge Mason, the late collector, took formal leave of his official associates, they having, upon his invitation, assembled in his private room in the Custom House for that purpose. After offering them refreshments, the Judge addressed them a few parting words. saying that, if success had attended his administration of the office from which he had just retired, it was due rather to his officers than to himself, and fully realizing the obligation, he had asked them to meet him, for the double purpose of thanking them for the interest they had shown for his welfare, which they had manifested in the faithful discharge of their duties-and secondly for the purpose of bidding them an affectionate farewell. We part, be said, under very different circumstances from those under which we met. We have not only witnessed and lamented the death of an unusually large nun ber of our official associates and cherished friend: but we now also behold our once glorious and happ country discordant and dismembered. Camp Curtin-Outrage by the Soldiers on ALL LETTERS TO BE ADDRESSED TO THI Harrisburg, April 30 .- Over 5,000 men are now in camp at Harrisburg. They consume daily 6,500 pounds of fresh beef, 6,500 pounds of bread, 600 pounds of sugar, 300 pounds of coffee, 100 pounds of candles, 4 bushels of salt, and 13 bushels of beans. Not more than 15 barrels of mess rock have been used out of the 700 barrels sent here, the men refusing to eat it. It is estimated the cost of subsistence alone is \$1,200 per day. Five soldiers attached to a Delaware county company were to-day sent out to arrest deserters. During their travel they abused several citizens, and subsequently entered a public house, got frenzied with liquor, charged | bayonets in a crowded room, and wounded a citizen severely, though not dangerously.
