## HAEBAS CORPUS.

"Next to personal security," says Mr. Justice Blackton, "the law of England regards, as next in importance, the personal liberty of individuals. This personal liberty consists in the power, or locution, of changing situation, or of being detained without cause shown, to which he is entitled as a person, unless by direct, without impeachment of privilege, or by restraint, unless by due course of law." 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## FROM OUR SECOND AND THIRD EDITIONS OF YESTERDAY.

### BY THE PHILADELPHIA INQUIRY.

The Philadelphia Inquirer has the following letter from Martinsburg, dated the 12th, which may be seen in our issue of yesterday.

Last evening a detachment of the Third Pennsylvania Regiment left here for Fort Delaware, and took with them five prisoners.

Two of Doubleday's 24-pounders have been sent back to Martinsburg, a row, we believe, Harper's Ferry, and it is probable that the 24th regiment Pennsylvania Volunteers will be sent to the same destination, to guard the reconstruction of the railroad.

The Philadelphia Inquirer has issued orders to Mr. Brown, Superintendent of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, to have it repaired, and Colonel Keely, with the First Maryland Regiment, is to protect the men and the work.

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
