City Items.

Another Outrage.—Yesterday afternoon, upon the passage of the 5th Regiment of Wisconsin troops through Charles street, several young men, among whom was one named G. H. Collected at the door of Dr. Edward James's office, No. 87 N. Charles street, near Malberry, to witness their passage.

The Union Convention.—The recently elected delegates to the City Union Convention met last evening, and after an angry session of some three hours, adjourned without any definite action in reference to the selection of a site for the State Convention.

Honorably Discharged.—Clinton James, whose arrest while on board the steamer Mary Washington, on suspicion of having been concerned in the riot of the 19th of April, was notified yesterday that he was honorably discharged by the Federal Marshal.

Successors of Federal Troops.—Some three hundred men, attached to the command of Col. Mann's Pennsylvania Reserve, arrived last night, about 12 o'clock, by way of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad.

More Protestors.—Yesterday morning a large party, among whom were several Federal soldiers, were having a picnic on the property near the city jail.

Arrested on the Charge of Stealing.—Solomon Wendell was yesterday arrested by Federal police officers having a charge of stealing a fine coat and hat, valued at \$25, from the property of Mr. J. C. Dorman, residing at No. 64 Pratt street.

Alleged Deserters.—The Federal police of the Western District have arrested Charles G. Smith and Wm. Clary, on the charge of being deserters from the Second Maryland Regiment.

From Harper's Ferry. The Harper's Ferry correspondent of the Philadelphia Ledger has received advice by a fugitive from Leeburg, who says: In Leeburg there are six hundred troops stationed, and around the town from ten to twelve thousand men are being drilled every day.
