From Washington. The Washington correspondent of the Philadelphia Inquirer states the grounds of Ex-Minister Faulkner's arrest as follows:

Ex-Minister Charles J. Faulkner, who has recently returned from France, was today arrested and confined in the city prison. He is charged with aiding the Rebel agents in Europe, and in being about to assume the command of a Rebel brigade in Virginia.

The whole south bank of the river is lined with batteries to impede the navigation of the Potomac and cut off supplies coming to Washington in that way.

Batteries are now being erected at Quantico Creek and Fort Detting, which is at right angles with Manassas Junction.

Another correspondent says that Prince Napoleon's party were strongly impressed with the numbers, skill and efficiency, as well as the ample appointments of the Confederate army.

The writer adds the names of the interesting positions between Bailey's Cross Roads and Manassas, including Falls Church, Springfield, Vienna, Centerville, the site of Germantown, Fairfax, Fairfax Station, Union Mills, Langley, &c.

The Washington correspondent of the New York Journal of Commerce says: There is no longer any doubt of the fact that the Confederates have made treaties of alliance, offensive and defensive, with Indian tribes.

But it is already manifest that the Confederates have felt the importance of settling at once the territorial question, upon which question they succeeded and went to war.
