The Latest News. The Washington correspondent of the N. Y. Herald says:

It has been ascertained that the Confederate General Magruder left Yorktown a few days ago with about 7,000 of the Confederate forces there, and went in the direction of Richmond. It is supposed they were to join the column of Beauregard. This is construed into a preparation on

their part for an attack upon our lines here. A rumor is current that Mr. Corcoran, the celebrated banker and money lender here, has proposed to aid the rebels by loaning them money. Nearly all the cases of insubordination that have occurred among our volunteers, whether on service or waiting to be mustered out, is attributable to the failure to pay them off promptly.

The following is the resolution adopted by the Committee of the New York Banks, which has to be acted upon to-day at 11 o'clock in general

An immediate issue to be made by the Treasury Department, dated August 15, 1861, and bearing interest from that date, of Treasury notes bearing interest at 7.30, to the extent of fifty million dollars. The banks of New York, Boston and Philadelphia associated to take jointly this fifty millions at par, with the privilege of taking at par an additional fifty million October fitteenth by giving their decision to the Department October first; and also at par fifty million December. 15, by giving their decision December I, unless said amount shall have been previously subscribed as a national loan, it being understood and agreed that no other government stocks, bonds or Treasury notes, except those payable on demand, shall be negotiated or paid out by the government until February 1, 1862, should the associates avail of both privileges—or until December 15, 1861, should they avail of the first only—or until October 15, 1861, if they take but the present fifty million-except that the government may negotiate in Europe, or through subscriptions to the

Meeting of the Democratic State Cen-

tral Committee. At a meeting of the Democratic State Central Committee, for the State of Maryland, held in the city of Baltimore, on Thursday the 15th day of August, 1861, the following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, a large majority of the members of both branches of the Legislature of Maryland have recommended to the citizens of this State, who are opposed to the present war and in favor of peace, to organize themselves in District, County and State Conventions, for the nomination and election of suitable candidates for Governor and other State officers, to be elected under the provisions of the Constitution during the coming fall; and that the County conventions in furtherance of the foregoing shall elect and send to the State Convention as many members as each county is entitled to in both branches of the Legislature of Marylannd, and that said convention do meet in the City of Baltimore on the 10th day of September

And whereas the State Democratic Central Committee believing that the present lamentable crisis in the affairs of this country involves considerations paramount to any of the political issues that have ever divided the people of Maryland or of the nation, and that it challenges the best efforts of every patriot heart for the restoration of that peace and prosperity which prevailed throughout the States up to the period of the inauguration of the administration of Abraham Lincoln. Therefore
