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FROM OUR SECOND AND THIRD EDITIONS OF YESTERDAY.

BY THE PHILADELPHIA TRAIN.

From the following despatches in the Philadelphia papers: Kansas City, August 22.—Information has been received of the organization of large forces of Confederates. From 1,500 to 1,700 more from Jackson county, all en route for the Confederate headquarters. Rumors of an attack on this city are current.

St. Louis, August 22.—John A. Brownlee was released from custody to-day, upon condition that he shall resign his position as President of the Board of Police Commissioners, leave the city and remain in some Free State, and not return here without the consent of the military authorities.

The following proclamation has been issued by Gen. Ben. McCulloch: "The still riles" as is evidenced by the numerous proclamations issued since the battle of Wilson's Creek.

Having been called upon by the Governor of your State to assist in driving the Federal forces out of the State, and in restoring the people their just rights, I have come among you simply as a volunteer. My only object is to give the oppressed of your State an opportunity of standing up as freemen, and uttering their true sentiments.

One and all of the true men of Missouri will rise up and rally around their standard. The State will not be divided. I do not come among you to make war upon any of you people whether Union or otherwise. The Union people will be protected in their rights and property, and it is recommended to them to return to their homes, and to the members of the Union party, who have been arrested by the army, will be released and allowed to return to their friends.

When Washington learned the late of the rebellion of his own country, for so he called Virginia, his heart was broken with grief and anger. He had seen the whole country in one insupportable bond against a man who had been his friend and ally.
