OLD FOGY DOCTRINES.

"We mold these truths to be self-erident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain analienable rights; that among these, are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That, to secure these rights, govern ments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their salety and happi nem. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that govern ments long established, should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience bath shown, that mankind are more dispond to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than right themselves by abulishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But, when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, erinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their tuture security."- Declaration of Indepen-

Our liberties and salety sannot be depended upon if the King of Great Britain should be allowed to hold our forts and cannon, or to have authority over a single regiment in America or a single ship of war in her ports. For if he holds our torts he may turn them against us, as he did Hoston against her proprietors; if he acquires our cannon he will effectually disarm the colony; if he has a command of troops among us, even it we raise and pay them, shackles will be fixed upon us-witness Ireland and liament cannot give us security, for acts of Parliament are as easily repealed as made. Royal proclamations are not to be depended upon, witness the Augustine. Even a change of ministry will not avail us, because, notwithstanding the rapid succession of ministers, for which the British Court has been famous during the present reign, yet the same ruinous policy ever continued to prevuil against America. In short, I think it my duty to declare, in the awful seat of justice and before Almighty God, that in my opinion the Americans can have no salety but by the Divine favor, their own virtue, and their being so prudent as NOT TO TRANK IT IN THE POWER OF THE BRIDGE RULERS TO INJURE THEM.
