FROM NEW MEXICO.

Kansas City, Dec. 10.—The Santa Fe and Carson City mail arrived here last night, with dates

they attempt robberies. Measures are being taken to establish a mail route between Santa Fe and Denver City. By connecting a link of forty miles from Colorado to Mountain City, the route would be complete.

It is stated that Messrs. Roberts & Co., the contractors for carrying the mail from Independence to Santa Fe, intend putting coaches on that part of the road, when the facts are laid before the Post Office Department, and every effort will be made for its success. With the aid of the Pacific telegraph from Denver city, Santa Fe will then be placed within eight days' communication with

FROM HAVANA.

NEW YORK, December 11.—Per steamer Columbia, from Havana, advices to the 6th instant are received. The Confederate steamer Vanderbilt arrived there on the 3d, five days from New Or-

Charles Anderson and family arrived bere on the Columbia from Havana. He is a brother of General Robert Anderson. He escated from San Antonio and walked to Monterey, Mexico. Hewas treated with great kindness, by the Mexicans at Monterey and Tampico, whence he sailed on the British steamer Clyde to Havana.

He reports that British subjects were violently indignant at the scizure of Messrs. Mason and Slidell on the steamer Trent. The Clyde met the Spanish fleet within thirtysix hours sail of Vera Cruz, with fine weather.

The Mexicans were daily expecting the arrival of the allied fleet. The general feeling appeared to be hatred of Spain-all fends giving way to the sentiment of united resistance to the common enemy, and a frequent remark was that if the Spaniards came alone they would be warmly welcomed. No resistance, however, would be made at Vera-
