THE LETTER OF LIEUT. MAURY AND THE ADDRESS OF MR. BRECKINRIDGE.

In consequence of the very great demand for the letter of the eminent seaman, Lieutenant Maury, setting forth his views upon the subject of Secession, we shall re-publish it on Friday next in pamphlet form, as it originally appeared in the London Standard, without abbreviation.

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THE BURNSIDE EXPEDITION.

By an arrival at New York we are advised that the Burnside Expedition was passed on the 13th instant, in the afternoon, north of Hatteras Inlet. The Cincinnati Enquirer publishes the most complete account of it yet given, from which we make the following extracts:

Immediately after the Hatteras expedition the Government set to work to organize Divisions to gather together all the character and facts for further operations of its success. The Port Royal expedition was detailed ninety days ago to begin the preliminary preparations of another, though its destination and exact character were not definitely determined until a much later period. The early preparations were confined to the purchase and building of vessels fitted for the purpose, in the ports of New York and Boston. Any one who looks at the proportions of the fleet of transports as they now lie in the stream, can judge of the amount of labor required to gather together so many vessels, all combining the same peculiar characteristics.
