In the House of Representatives, after the reception of some executive communications of no importance, the case of the contested election between Messrs. Naylor and Ingersoll was called up as the special order of the day. A long debate arose on a motion to grant leave to Mr. Ingersoll to address the House in support of his claim. The motion for leave was finally agreed to. Mr. Ingersoll then appeared at the bar of the House, and at much length proceeded to urge his claim to the seat. At about three o'clock, being rather weary, a motion was made to adjourn, which was agreed to. I presume this matter will occupy the remainder of the week, as both the contestants are gentlemen not short of words. In the Senate, after the presentation of petitions, the bill granting to settlers on the public lands a permanent and prospective pre-emption right, was again taken up. After some debate, the bill was laid over. Last evening, pursuant to notice, the Secretary of War delivered his lecture to the members of the National Institution for the promotion of the useful arts.
