From the New Orleans Picayune. PRAIRIE SKETCHES. THE RANCHEROS. A knight in complete steel, with poised lance, spurring to the combat in sight of his lady-love, at a tournament of the olden time, formed not a more spirit-stirring or pleasure-inspiring spectacle than does a Mexican Rancho in pursuit of a buffalo calf to ensnare it with a lariat. The lariat is a rope, sometimes twenty feet in length, and even thirty, made of hemp generally, but frequently formed from plaited strings of buffalo hide, softened well to obtain the necessary pliability; one end is turned into a slip-noose, and the use of both hands is required in throwing the rope.
