It is possible that defects may be discovered when the bill shall have been darried into practical operation; for there are few enactments, applicable to important subjects, and involving diversity of interests, that do not require amendment when tested by experience. The bill before us has been carefully drawn, and appears to afford the requisite protection to debtor and creditor, and this is all that can be asked.

We have so repeatedly expressed our sentiments in favor of the abolition of imprisonment for debt, that repetition would be superfluous. The measure is called for by public feeling, and we are happy to find that Mr. Legrand has promptly brought it to the consideration of the legislature. Imprisonment for debt should be consigned to the tomb, along with kindred laws which have ceased to disgrace our statete books. We hope that the legislature will not suffer the present session to pass without definitive action on the subject.
