CITY COURT, Feb. 12, 1861. Present, Judges Brice, Nisbet and Worthington.

Abduction of Slaves. A suit on a writ of Habeas Corpus was put upon trial, charged with assisting, enticing and persuading of two slaves, one named Lloyd Howard and the other Nicholas Howard, both being the property of Richard Dorsey, Esq. The alleged crime on the part of Adams was shown to be in violation of an act of Assembly, made and approved 1827, ch. 15, sec. 1, wherein it is stated, that any person engaged in any way, as principal or assistant, in attempting to entice slaves away from their masters, shall be subject to punishment in the state prison.

Richard Dorsey, witness for the state, was called upon the stand. Said he was owner of the abducted slaves; that they left his house on the 21st Dec., 1859; that he had no knowledge of the accused having any connection with the affair.

Mr. Star was next called up. Witness lives 23 miles from Baltimore on the York road, on the night of the 21st Dec. 1859, about 12 o'clock, saw a hack going past his house; suspected that something was not right; pursued it, and in company with Mr. Kidd arrested the driver about 4 miles from the Pennsylvania line; on stopping the hack, two black fellows made their escape from it; did not arrest the negroes, but secured the driver; put him in irons; the hackman's name is James Wilson, alias Indiana Jim; Wilson was brought to witness' house; found in hack a hat with Lloyd Howard's name written in it, also a carpet bag containing clothes, which were afterwards recognized by Mr. Dorsey as the property which he had given his servants.

Mr. Kidd was called up, and deposed to about the same in substance as had been given by Mr. Star. James Wilson, alias Indiana Jim, was next put upon the stand. This witness was the most important on the part of the state. We would here remark that this witness was the hack-driver who had the slaves in charge, and had, according to his statement, been employed to transport them to Strasburg, Pa. We would further remark that Wilson was found guilty of the charge of abduction at the previous term of court, as being an accessory to the same offence for which Adams is now being tried. His sentence by the court has been deferred for the purpose of using his testimony in the case of the present traverser.

This same Adams was also tried and found guilty for the charge now against him at the previous term of court, but through the interference of some friends was granted a new trial. The testimony of Wilson seemed contradictory. He stated however that Adams had employed him on the 21st Dec., 1859, to take two men to Strasburg, Pa., for which he was to receive 25 dollars; that Adams came to his hack, in Calvert-st., with the two men about dark; they got into the hack; Adams bade them farewell, and witness proceeded on his way; did not know whether the inmates of the hack were white or black. That he proceeded out the York road about 23 miles when he was overtaken and handcuffed; had never been so far out that road before, not farther than Cockeys'. The witness here became wearied, seemed to lose his recollection, stated that long imprisonment and sickness had almost destroyed his senses.

Nancy Wilson, sworn. Am wife of Wilson; Adams came to see her husband; said he was in a hurry; husband said that William Adams had employed him to take two colored gentlemen away; lives in Park street; Adams came to her house in the evening.

Richard Dorsey, Jr. sworn. Am a nephew of Mr. Dorsey—reside with him—frequently saw Adams in conversation with uncle's servants. Saw him him three or four days previous to their departure. Adams at times seemed timid when observed in company with my uncle's slaves.

Mr. Zell was called upon the stand. He went out to Star's, found the property there which had been in custody of the slaves, &c. The witnesses on the part of the state having been gone through, Mr. Buchanan, counsel for the prisoner, arose and briefly stated to the jury what he intended to establish. Various witnesses were then called to testify in behalf of the prisoner, among whom were Judge Heath, S. T. Wallace, Esq. Wm. Gwinn, Esq., who stated that he believed Adams to be the best servant in the world, except his Moses. There was no want of testimony on the part of the accused to establish his good character. His honor, Judge Heath, stated he had known the prisoner from 1826 to the present, and that a greater part of that time the accused had been his slave—though owing to his good conduct he had liberated him. Col. Davies also testified to Adams good character. Samuel A. Price testified that Adams attended a meeting over which he presided, and was in his presence about seven o'clock on the same evening, and about the same time that Wilson testified he (Adams) had been at his hack on Calvert street. Some other witnesses were examined, whose testimony is of but little importance and too tedious to give at length. The jury went into their room, and will probably return a sealed verdict to-morrow morning.

Stealing. Mary Henderson, a negro, was put in the bar, charged with stealing forty pieces of silver, the property of Caleb Foster. She was not ready for trial—and wanted to remove her case.

Charles Handy was brought up, charged with stealing property to a small amount from S. Donohoe. He was not ready for trial.

John T. Hall was put upon trial, charged with assault and battery, but he was not ready for his trial.

State vs. Lewis Morris, for assault and battery on the person of John Swain. The court declared the traverser not guilty.

The court adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.
