WASHINGTON, Feb. 13, 1841. The Senate, having passed the treasury note bill last evening, was not in session to-day.

Mr. Pickens, from the committee on foreign affairs, to whom had been referred the correspondence between Messrs. Fox and Forsyth, in relation to the burning of the Caroline and the imprisonment of McLeod, made a report thereon.

Mr. Granger denounced it as tantamount to a declaration of war, and made a speech to shew the impropriety of having it printed under the official sanction of the House.

Mr. Pickens denied that the report was of that character. On the contrary he considered it as having a tendency to preserve peace, by shewing that we were determined not to be imposed upon.

Other members participated in the debate, which terminated in a motion to print being carried.

The report cannot fail to create a great excitement through the country.
