To relieve myself from this injustice I sometimes mentioned that I did not believe the metres to be entirely correct, but that I was obliged to return the measure as I found it. Great dissatisfaction has prevailed with the consumers of gas, and whilst the present system is continued that

dissatisfaction will not be decreased. I have uniformly been treated with the greatest respect by the consumers of gas, for which they will accept my thanks. I have always desired to do them justice, and hope that the gas company may manifest the same disposition. The situation I occupied was not an enviable one, and I have the sa isfaction to respectability, where I shall not be subjected to the
