FACTOR'S LAW. There are always two sides toe question. The bill requiring factors to pay 350 per annum license, and 30 cente per \$100 for all goods sold belonging to persons out of the state of Maryland, has, as was to have been expected, excited some feeling among those whom it will particularly affect. But the bill is not to be considered in relation to individual interests alone, but as it may affect the general prosperity of the city. We think that it requires modifiestion in one particular: the products of the soil should be exempted from its operation. With this amendment, it is at least questionable whether it will prove more injurious than beneficial to the community.
