MARYLAND LEGISLATURE. Annapolis, March 8, 1841. House of Delegates. Mr. Orrick presented petitions of sundry citizens, praying the passage of an act interdicting the issuing of licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors...

Mr. E. A. Lynch submitted an order, that the bill for the completion of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal to Cumberland shall be the standing order of the House in the afternoon session from the hour of five o'clock until the same be disposed of.

Mr. Jones, of Somerset, from the Committee on Ways and Means, to which were referred the amendments proposed by the Senate to the bill reported by Mr. Callagher, supplementary to an act, to vest certain powers in the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, &c. asked that said Committee be discharged from its further consideration.

CITY COUNCIL. FIRST BRANCH, March 9. The Branch met pursuant to adjournment. Present, H. Seyder, president, and all the members except Mr. Dryden.

Mr. Pinsky presented the petition of William Wallace, praying a remuneration for services rendered the city authorities, which was referred to the committee on claims.
