BALTIMORE AND OHIO RAIL ROAD. PROPOSALS are invited for the following description of MATERIALS to be used in the construction of the Railway Track between Harper's Ferry and Cumberland.

54,500 do do do do do 3,725,000 feet. Making together, 6,000,000 feet. Herein Timber for 712 and 800.

52,500 Iron Chairs, weighing 1 lb. each, 405,000 lbs. 52,500 Middle do do do 211,000 52,500 Bottom Plates, do do 145,000

105,000 Feet of Board 7 1/2 inches long, and 1 1/2 inches wide, 105,000 Nuts for same, (17 1/2 sq. ft., 3-16 thick), wt. 1 lb. each.

105,000 Washers, of a wedge form, 3/4 inches thick, and 1 1/2 inch average thickness, and weighing 1 lb. 105,000 Feet of rolled Zinc, same length and width, and 1 1/2 thick, weighing 10 to the pound.

644,000 Hook-headed Spikes, 4 1/2 inches long, 7-16 square in the shank, and weighing 1 1/2 oz. each, 294,716 The Spikes may be of white or yellow pine, with not more than an inch of sap on two edges of the stick...

Proposals to whom more than one of the places just named are acceptable, will specify the price for delivery at each, so as to allow an option to the Company in regard to them should the proposal be accepted.

The Ass'n Timber, intended for the cross-ties and support-blocks, may be of white-oak, rock-oak or straight oak, or of chestnut. It must be sawed and straightened in one direction. If the proposer prefers delivering it in the rough state, and does not wish to undertake the boring of it to the required dimensions he can so word his proposal, and in that case the size of the sticks must be such as to permit them, as vena dressed, to be of the full dimensions specified, clear of bark and axe-holes, and to be cut before the delivery. The delivery may be made upon any point of the line, between Harper's Ferry and Cumberland, and the points between which it will take place must be stated.

There are to every mile of track 1,250 feet board measure of 4 1/2 inch, and 200,000 of 3 1/2 inch, and 300,000 of 3 inch thick. Proposals will not be received for a less quantity of any of the kinds of timber, than will lay a mile-track.

The Castings for the chairs and plates will be of an easy pattern—they must be of strong and good metal, and smoothly cast. The nuts and washers will be of round iron, and made with exactness to the required form and size. The washers will be of bar-iron, rolled with the proper section, cut off and punched for the passage of the bolt. The zinc plates similarly made. The hook-headed spikes to be of iron of as good a quality as that of the bolts and nuts.

The Iron Partings just described may be delivered at Baltimore, Harper's Ferry, Cumberland, or any point of the line of the road between the two latter places, and the places and times of delivery will be stated in the proposals. There are to every mile of track 75 lbs. of iron washers—150 lbs. of zinc plates, and 2200 lbs. of spikes. No proposal for a less quantity than will supply 10 miles will be received.

Monthly estimates will be made of the quantities of each kind of materials to be delivered, and four-fifths of the amount of contract prices will be paid thereon—reserving to the Company the option of paying the said four-fifths in Baltimore City 6 per cent stock at par—or in the stock orders of the Company at par; and also reserving the option of paying for the remaining fifth in like manner, when the delivery of the whole quantity contracted for, shall have been completed according to the contract.

If the materials contracted for, or any part of them are not furnished at the times required, the Company may dissolve the contract and retain the one-fifth due on any which may have been already delivered, and on any such dissolution payments shall be made on account of materials delivered before the time specified for commencing the delivery of the same. The monthly payments shall be made at the Company's office in Baltimore, Cumberland, or Martinsburg, Virginia, at the option of the contractor, and the final payment shall be made in Baltimore. The manner and times in which the materials shall be furnished on the different parts of the line will be specifically provided for in the contracts, and particulars will be given on application to the undersigned. It will be required that about one-half of the whole quantity of materials shall be delivered as early as possible between now and the 15th of December next. A model of the rail and its supports and fastenings will be ready for inspection at the Company's office in Baltimore by the 20th current.
