

To CORRESPONDENTS. Poetical communications have accumulated upon our heads of late, with an increased ratio. This, however, may be accounted for. It is owing to the approach of spring; or, in other words, that season so congenial to the inspirings of sentimentality, love, courtship, sabillity, beauty, &c.

There are some of our correspondents who no doubt mean well in their attempts to poetize, but unfortunately fall into the incessable error of putting together, in a very awkward way, what may be termed very indifferently rhyme. A want of correct measurement and a frequent repetition of rhyming words in a short piece shall always insure its rejection. Poetry, to be readable, must contain ideas, and not old ones either, but those of a novel character handsomely expressed. The subject should be appropos and the production, whether prose or poetry, commensurate with it. Agreeably to the above rule, we are necessarily compelled to refuse the publication of a number of pieces now upon our table.

"The Beauties of May," by W. L. G. shall be kept on file until the ushering-in of that delightful month, when they shall be presented to the reader. A second perusal of a piece on temperance, by the same author, has caused its rejection.

"Impromptu," by "Cosmo," shall appear. Stanzas by "Francis," have been approved. To "The Bride." This is a production by Emily. We think it very pretty and shall give it a place in our columns. Also, her lines on the death of Gen. Harrison.

"A Traveller" shall have a place. Stanzas to Miss S***** by "S." are altogether objectionable. The writer must have been lost in love—his thoughts ran too much upon kissing—his piece is a horrible jumble—out of measure, rhyme and every thing else except sickening sentimentality.

"G. W. M." must be patient. His piece, however, on the death of our late lamented President is faulty. It contains some pretty ideas, but is interspersed with lines having the seeds of condemnation. We therefore lay it aside.

"H. J. J." on the same subject is refused. A prose production by "S." attempting to show a descent from the sublime to the ridiculous, fails in its object. The writer has oversteer the mark.

We are much obliged to our correspondent "Domesticus," at Washington, D. C., for his letter, but it came to hand rather late. The production of our esteemed poetess H. L., amounting in substance to a rebuke upon certain authorities, though handsomely written, is laid aside, subsequent movements having superseded the necessity of its publication.

"Switch" is informed that our friend "Chips" has turned his attention to music, and is now so thronged with scholars that he has hardly time to treat the Muses with common courtesy, even when they make him a friendly visit. He has promised, however, to give us a touch when he gets the key note in order.

"W. M. F. P." has done tolerably well, but his piece is objectionable. "Think of Me," by E. F. B. of Washington, D. C., is very poor indeed. If the author will remunerate us for damages sustained in paying the postage, he can have his document returned. The Impromptu by "Ringwood" is not poetry—it is words made to rhyme after a fashion. It is rejected.

"J. D." is very clever in his way, but we presume he does not intend his production for publication. The Ode by T. C. R. has some very pretty expressions, but with them there are faults too numerous to be looked over. We must therefore be excused from publishing. The same faults may be found with another piece, having no signature, which commences—

"And the muffled drum rolled on the air." The temperance candidate shall have a place. "The Shower" is in our humble opinion too dry for so moist a subject. T. L. W. will therefore think better of us when informed that it cannot be published.

Thus have we finished a very delicate and precarious task. Those of our correspondents who have been unfortunate must not "give up the ship." We shall be happy to hear from them all, and give publicity to such of their productions as we may be induced to believe will please and edify the reader, provided they meet our approbation.

How contemptible is the character of the habitual tattler, who, to indulge his desire to tell tales, will resort to the most mean-spirited and ignoble means. Such a man will be found repeating confidential conversations, magnifying the most innocuous remarks, so as to give them the appearance of malignity; he will not hesitate to become the base medium of communicating unguarded expressions, uttered while under the influence of passion, or to avail of any mean advantage to collect and distribute this sort of information; even though his disclosures may blast the reputation of his best friend, he will not regret them. His presence is as much to be dreaded as that of disease; indeed more so, for that can be cured, or its effects confined to its immediate victims, and cease with its removal—while the hatred, jealousy, petty spite, malice, and all kinds of embittered feeling which are the fruitful offspring of tale-bearing, remain for indefinite periods; strengthen with age, and often terminate with life only. The tale-bearer produces more mischief and destroys more happiness than the thief, who steals but "trash," and injures but the purses of a few; while the former stoops to the same means, to steal words, which can in no way benefit him, but which he uses to the injury of many. A tale-bearer is a stinking, pusillanimous, unhappy, much to be dreaded wretch—and should be shunned when known as one of the greatest pests and evils with which society is afflicted.

CITY OF BALTIMORE.

ORDINANCE No. 15.

An Ordinance for the Division of the City of Baltimore into fourteen Wards.

Be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, That from and after the passage of this Ordinance the City of Baltimore shall be divided into fourteen Wards, bounded and described as follows, that is to say:

The FIRST WARD to comprise all that part of the city contained within the following bounds—Beginning on the centre line of Market St. Fell's Point, with the water of the harbor; and thence along the line of said street to the centre line of Fleet street; and thence westwardly on said line to the centre line of Bond St.; and thence on said street, northwardly to the centre line of E. Baltimore street; and thence eastwardly with said line and the Philadelphia road to the east line of the city; and thence with said line southwardly to the water of the harbor; and thence with said water to the place of beginning.

The SECOND WARD to comprise all that part of the city contained within the following bounds—Beginning on the centre line of Market street, Fell's Point, and the water of the harbor; and thence northwardly along said line to the centre line of Fleet street; and thence westwardly with said line to the centre line of Bond street; and thence westwardly on said line to the centre line of Canal-st.; and thence southwardly on said line to the city dock; and thence with the line of said water to the place of beginning.

The THIRD WARD to comprise all that part of the city contained within the following bounds—Beginning on the centre line of East Baltimore and Canal streets; thence northwardly on the centre line of Canal street to Pitt street; thence on the centre line of said street westwardly to the water of the city dock; and thence on said line to the centre line of the Harbor Turnpike road; thence eastwardly on said line to the north line of the city; and thence on the north and east boundary line to the centre line of the Philadelphia road; and thence westwardly on said road and East Baltimore street, to the place of beginning.

The FOURTH WARD to comprise all that part of the city contained within the following bounds—Beginning on the centre line of Pitt street and Jones' Falls; and thence on the centre line of Pitt street eastwardly to the centre line of Canal street; and thence on said line southwardly to the water of the city dock; and thence on said water westwardly to the centre line of Jones' Falls; and thence northwardly on said line to the place of beginning.

The FIFTH WARD to comprise all that part of the city contained within the following bounds—Beginning on the centre line of East Baltimore and Canal streets; thence northwardly on the centre line of Canal street to Pitt street; thence on the centre line of said street westwardly to the water of the city dock; and thence on said line to the centre line of the Harbor Turnpike road; thence eastwardly on said line to the north line of the city; and thence on the north and east boundary line to the centre line of the Philadelphia road; and thence westwardly on said road and East Baltimore street, to the place of beginning.

The SIXTH WARD to comprise all that part of the city contained within the following bounds—Beginning on the centre line of East Baltimore and Canal streets; thence northwardly on the centre line of Canal street to Pitt street; thence on the centre line of said street westwardly to the water of the city dock; and thence on said line to the centre line of the Harbor Turnpike road; thence eastwardly on said line to the north line of the city; and thence on the north and east boundary line to the centre line of the Philadelphia road; and thence westwardly on said road and East Baltimore street, to the place of beginning.

The SEVENTH WARD to comprise all that part of the city contained within the following bounds—Beginning at the Belvidere bridge over Jones' Falls; thence southwardly along the centre of Jones' Falls; thence along the centre of Jones' Falls to the mouth thereof at the north side of the basin; thence westwardly along the north side of the basin to Gay street; thence along Gay street to East Baltimore street; thence westwardly on said street to North street; thence northwardly along said street to the place of beginning.

The EIGHTH WARD to comprise all that part of the city which is contained within the following bounds—Beginning at the Belvidere bridge over Jones' Falls; thence southwardly along the centre of Jones' Falls; thence along the centre of Jones' Falls to the mouth thereof at the north side of the basin; thence westwardly along the north side of the basin to Gay street; thence along Gay street to East Baltimore street; thence westwardly on said street to North street; thence northwardly along said street to the place of beginning.

The NINTH WARD to comprise all that part of the city contained within the following bounds—Beginning at the intersection of Hanover and Pratt streets; thence along the centre of Hanover street to Ostend street; thence west along Ostend street to the north side of the middle branch of the Patapsco; thence along the shores of the middle, main and northwest branch of the Patapsco to Light street; thence along the eastern side of Light street to Pratt street; thence along the centre of Pratt street to the place of beginning.

The TENTH WARD to comprise all that part of the city contained within the following bounds—Beginning at the intersection of Pratt and Hanover streets; thence southwardly along the centre of Hanover street to Ostend street; thence west along Ostend street to the north side of the middle branch of the Patapsco; thence along the shores of the middle, main and northwest branch of the Patapsco to Light street; thence along the eastern side of Light street to Pratt street; thence along the centre of Pratt street to the place of beginning.

The ELEVENTH WARD to comprise all that part of the city contained within the following bounds—Beginning at the intersection of Pratt and Hanover streets; thence southwardly along the centre of Hanover street to Ostend street; thence west along Ostend street to the north side of the middle branch of the Patapsco; thence along the shores of the middle, main and northwest branch of the Patapsco to Light street; thence along the eastern side of Light street to Pratt street; thence along the centre of Pratt street to the place of beginning.

The TWELFTH WARD to comprise all that part of the city contained within the following bounds—Beginning at the intersection of Fayette and Faca streets; thence south along Faca street to the place of beginning; thence east along Fayette street to the middle branch of the Patapsco; thence along the north shore of the middle branch of the Patapsco to the city limits to Fayette street; thence east along Fayette street to the place of beginning.

The THIRTEENTH WARD to comprise all that part of the city contained within the following bounds—Beginning at the intersection of Green and Fayette streets; thence northwardly along Green street to Pennsylvania street; thence along Pennsylvania street to the city limits; thence eastwardly along the city limits to Cathedral street; thence southwardly along Cathedral street to the place of beginning.

The FOURTEENTH WARD to comprise all that part of the city contained within the following bounds—Beginning at the intersection of Mulberry and Cathedral streets; thence westwardly along Mulberry street to Green street; thence northwardly along Green street to Pennsylvania street; thence along Pennsylvania street to the city limits; thence eastwardly along the city limits to Cathedral street; thence southwardly along Cathedral street to the place of beginning.
