THE NEW PRESIDENT. The Wheeling Gazette states that "Joun Tries was born in Virginin in 1790, and is therefore about 51 years of age. He graduated at William and Mary college, at 21 years of age, and was chosen a delegate to the State Legislature, in which capacity he serred several years, until he was elected Representative in Congress. After a service of four years, he became again a member of the Virginia Legislature, and was soon chosen Governor of the State.

"At the expiration of his constitutional term as Governor, Mr. Tyler was elected to the United States Senate, to serve from the 4th of March, 1827, in the place of the late John Randolph, of Rosnoke, whom he beat. He was re-elected in 32-33, and continued until the Legislature gave him instructions which he could not obey, when he resigned."
