FAUNTLEROY.

WHO WAS HANGED FOR FORGERY ALIVE. It may seem strange, but no less true, that there are strong opinions abroad that Fauntleroy, the tinker who was several years ago convicted of and hanged for forgery...

IT IS SAID MOST CONFIDENTLY THAT FAUNTLEROY had a protection around his neck against the rope; that he was suspended but for a very short period, and that as soon as he was cut down he was immediately conveyed to a house in West Smithfield, where the necessary restoratives were immediately and successfully applied.

LATEST FROM FLORIDA. The Savannah Republican of Thursday, the 22d inst. says: We yesterday received several letters from our attentive correspondents in Florida, forwarded by the steamer Gen. Clinch, Capt. Brooks.

THE DESPATCHES WHICH PASSED THROUGH TOWN yesterday to the Adjutant and Commissary General, were perforated by a bullet shot from the rifle of the Indian who murdered the express rider mentioned in one of the subjoined letters:

FLORIDA, April 17, 1841. GENTLEMEN: The express rider from Tampa Bay to Pilatka, has not been heard of since he left Anautiliga on the 12th inst. He is doubtless killed by the Indians, as his horse has been found with his saddle bags, two bullet holes through them. So war is ending!

SENTENCE OF DEATH ON A PROTESTANT CLERGYMAN. Richard Sandes was indicted at the Carroll Assizes, on Wednesday last, for that he, being a degraded clergyman of the Church of England, did perform a marriage between John Lalor and Sarah Howard, both Protestants.

THE DAYS OF CHIVALRY. DEPARTMENT STATE, April 26, 1841. Information has been received from our Charge d' Affaires at Stockholm, that a light-house has been erected, consisting of a high tower of stone, bearing a fixed light of the third order, visible at the distance of three sea leagues, on the Island of Hvinga, at the entrance of the harbor of Gottenburg; and that two other lights will also be placed, one at Huskaret and the other at Botla, as guides for vessels in passing through the channel of entrance to the harbor.

AFRAY IN GRAND GULF. The Advertiser mentions an affray in front of the Messrs. Smith's Exchange Hotel. A private misunderstanding having arisen between Sugars Turner, Esq. of Assumption Parish, La., and H. W. Barnes, Esq. of that county, Mr. Turner was in the act of drawing a pistol when he was shot down almost instantly by his antagonist, five buckshot having entered his forehead immediately above the eyes, glancing over the skull bone and coming out in five different places on his head.

A FACTORY DESTROYED. On Friday night last the store of Charles Sacriste, Esq. on the Brandywine near Brake's Cotton Works, was destroyed by fire, together with nearly all its contents. The property was partially insured, though the loss must be heavy.

SEVEN PETITIONS FOR DIVORCES WERE PRESENTED at the Vice Chancellor's Court of New York on Tuesday last—five of which were made by the softer sex.

CURRY, the forger and fugitive from justice, who was demanded by the Governor of New York from the Governor of Virginia, has been safely returned to prison at Ithaca, New York.

FROM HAVANA. The steamship Natchez, Capt. Swiler, says the New Orleans Picayune of the 20th inst., arrived yesterday from Havana with dates to the 15th inst. She brought over 70 passengers.

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
