If then, we desire to be pre-'pared to resist aggression, we must furnish the means. This can be done by either of three modes—borrow the sum necessary; collect it by 1 taxation; or raise it by duties upon articles of lexury. If we adopt the first method, we only postpone the day of taxation—if the second, the burthens, which are already heavy upon the people, will be increased, and may become perpetual. By the third, (duties,) we tax the wealthy only, and leave all other classes of society untouched.
