THE U. S. FRIGATE BRANDYNE arrived at New York, on Monday last, in thirty days from the Straits of Gibraltar. The return of this frigate from her station was occasioned by the threatening aspect some six or eight weeks ago, of war with Great Britain. Intelligence received at Port Mahon, at that time from the American Ambassador at London, under date of the 9th of March, and private intelligence from the Mediterranean, led to a council between Commodore Hull and the Captains, on board the Ohio 74, on the 24th, which resulted in the sailing of the day, at twelve hours' notice, on the succeeding day. The frigate, after ascertaining, by looking into the Bay of Gibraltar, that no naval reinforcement, as was reported, had assembled, hastened home, as the best point of learning the existing relations of the two countries, and the wishes of the Government in the case. GALE AT THE SOUTH. The Savannah Republican of Wednesday says: we learn through a gentleman from the South that it blew almost a gale in Camden and Glynn counties, and that nearly all the fields of Sea Island Cotton in that vicinity were destroyed, the leaves being in some instances blown from the stalks. We apprehend that the damage has been rather serious in some places, but fortunately it is not too late to plant again. The violence of the wind was so great as to tear the potato vines from the ground. At St. Mary's the gale was tremendous. Some houses were so much shaken that the inmates feared for their safety—and the sidewalks were covered to the depth of several inches by the drifting sand.

Capt. Pitcher of the steamer Isis, going up the St. Johns at the time, states that the air was full of dust, which glowing in the sun, produced the appearance of fire in the woods on both sides of the river.

MARINE NEWS. The N. O. Picayune of the 4th inst. states that the ship Saratoga arrived at that port on the day previous from New York—that she spoke the steam barque Clarion, from New York for Havana, on the 25th of April, off Salt Key Bank. The wind was light from the eastward: the Clarion passed very quickly, going at least seven miles an hour against a short head swell, with all her canvas furled.

THE NEW ORLEANS MINT. So far as we can learn, says the Bulletin, this institution in our city, is proving its adequacy to perform all that was originally contemplated in its establishment. It has had to contend with many difficulties, but improvements in its management, the greater degree of science and economy now introduced into its laboratory, would lead us to hope that it may successfully vie with its rival in the North. In a day or two we shall probably be able to prove this.

NAVY. Commodore T. A. C. Jones, is appointed to the command of the Pacific Squadron, to relieve Commodore CLAXTON, who returns in the fall. Commodore CHARLES W. MORGAN, is appointed to the command of the Brazil Station. Commodores BIDDLE and READ and Captain CONNOR, compose a Board of Enquiry, now sitting in New York, on charges preferred against Com. RENSNAW.

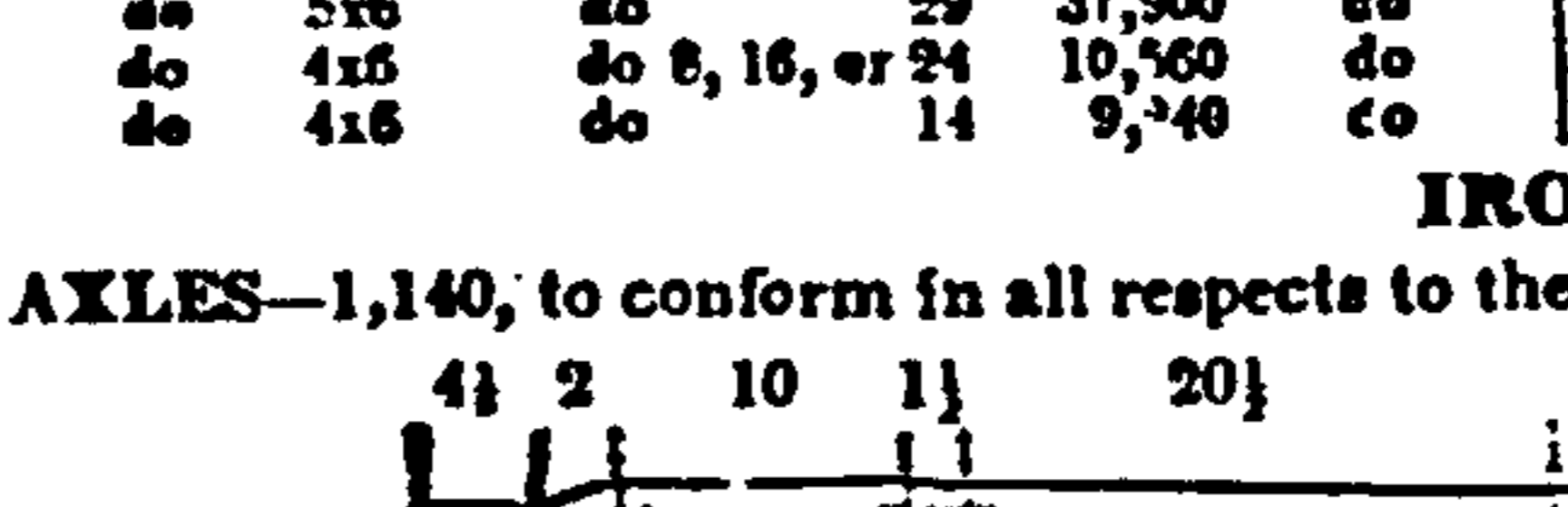

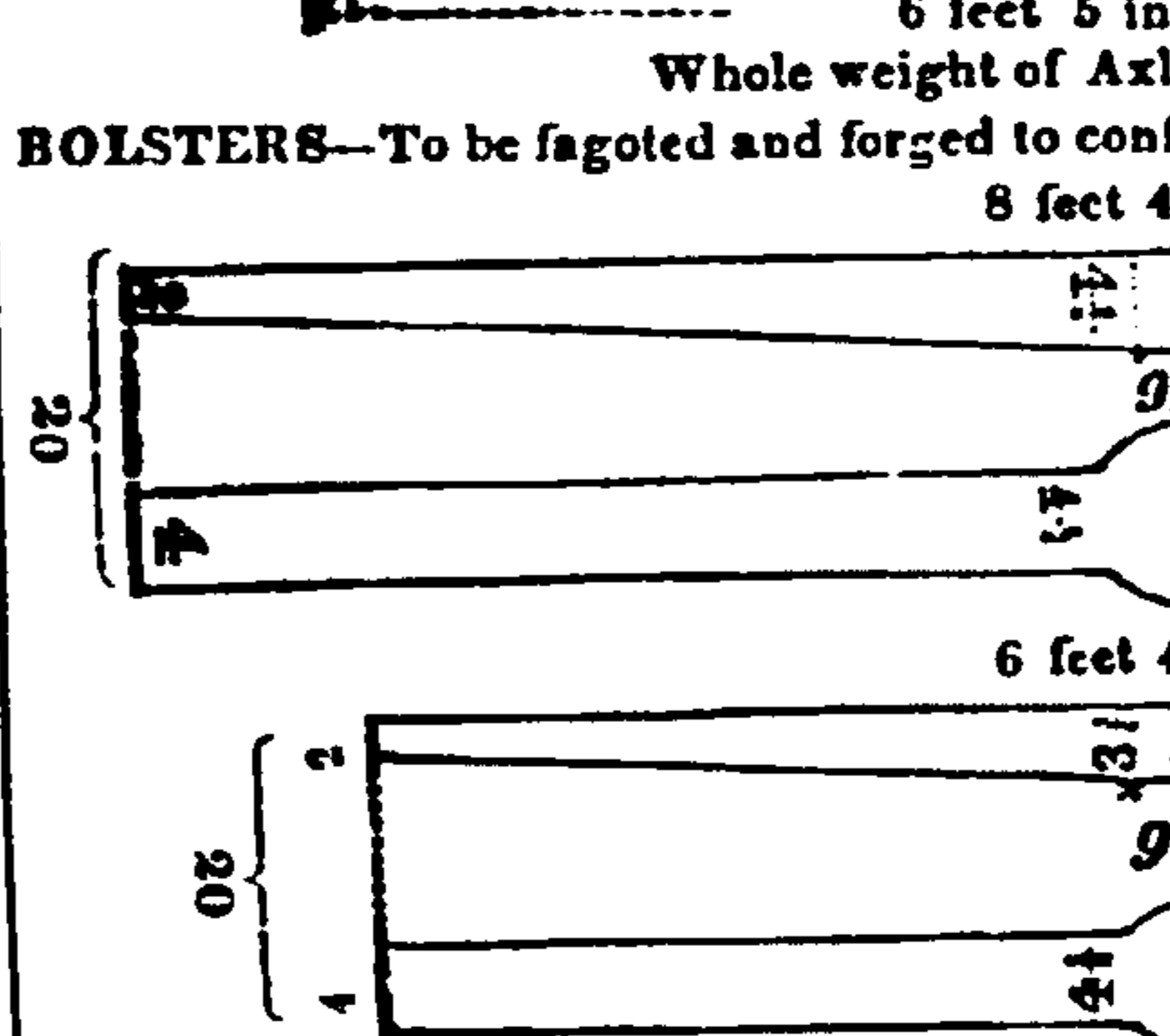
