PUBLIC MEETING. The reader will be glad to see that the Address heretofore delivered by William Rose, Esq. on the resources of Pennsylvania and the West, and the relations of trade which Baltimore now occupies in reference to them, will be repeated, by request, this evening, at the Musical Saloon of the Assembly Rooms.

BANK OF THE UNITED STATES. By the proceedings published to-day it will be seen, that, at a meeting of the stockholders of this Institution it was resolved to accept the law lately passed by the Legislature of Pennsylvania in relation to the Banks of that State.

A long report, in reply to Mr. Biddle's publications, was submitted by the investigating committee. It is drawn up with temper and skill; and, unless Mr. Biddle can remove the impressions which it cannot fail to make, he will be likely to suffer in public estimation.

POLICE. John Saucer was yesterday brought before Justice Pechin on a charge of assaulting and beating Emeline Gold. He is quite a valorous fellow, for besides striking a woman, he swore no single officer should take him.

Sam'l Allen, a sailor, was arrested and brought before Justice Jones, on a charge of stealing a pair of boots from Mr. Armstrong. He had sold the boots to a colored man for \$2. The only evidence against him was his own confession of having had the boots—but he said a man gave them to him to take into the colored man's shop to sell, and that the man waited at the door until he came out with the money.

Wm. Godman, an apprentice, charged with striking his master, Mr. Christopher Hergershammer, with an iron rod, was committed to jail by Justice Jones. Maria Alexander and child, suspected of being the runaway slaves of Mr. John H. Keene, were committed to jail by Justice Barnard.

Wm. H. Long, charged with being a fugitive from justice from Somerset county, Md. where he was confined for murder, but broke jail, was committed by Justice Barnard. He was arrested by John Mitchell, high constable.

CASE OF ALEXANDER McLEOD. At a few minutes after 10 o'clock on Tuesday morning, the New York Supreme Court was opened, and Mr. Wood, the District Attorney of Niagara began reading the documents deemed necessary by the counsel for the people.

The first read was the enrollment of the Caroline, dated 1st of December, 1837, and describing her as a steamboat of 45 tons, 71 feet long, and belonging to William Wells, of Buffalo.

Next her license, of the same date, authorizing her to navigate the Niagara river. Next a deposition of Captain Gilman Appleby, taken before Judge Bowen, December 12, 1840, when McLeod was brought before him on habeas corpus, after commitment by a magistrate.

The deposition described the attack upon the boat on the night of December 29, or morning of December 30. The case was continued by the examination of witnesses, &c. Mr. Hall then interfered, and said no farther evidence would be offered in behalf of the people.

Mr. Bradley followed, and addressed the Court at great length, contending, that the burning of the Caroline was a National act, and must have national recourse, &c. &c.

Mr. Woods, District Attorney for Niagara, then followed as counsel for the people, and when we left the Court, says the Evening Star, he was still speaking.

A BLACKGUARD. On Tuesday evening, as a lady was passing down Lexington Street, and when near the Court House, she was accosted by a gentleman, who continued to annoy her with his impertinent attentions, for more than a square distant. He is a tall good-looking fellow, and wears a cap.
