From the Boston Times Extra, Boston Mail, and Bay State Democrat. 11 DAYS LATER FROM ENGLAND. ARRIVAL OF THE CALEDONIA.

Non-arrival of the President-Meeting of Americans at Liverpool on account of the death of President Harrison-Parliamentary Procecdings-Disturbances in Ireland-France-Spain-Egypt-The East-Syria, &c.

The royal steamship Caledonia, Capt. McKellar, from Liverpool, whence she sailed on the 4th Halifax at 4 o'clock, P. M. on the 16th, and left on the following morning at 9 o'clock, making the passage to Boston from Liverpool in about 141 ds. She brought 44 passengers to Halifax from Liverpool, 23 from Liverpool to Boston, and 6 from Halifax to Boston.


