THE COLLECTOR being now prepared to distribute his tax bills for the year 1841, respectfully calls the attention of all tax payers to some of the provisions of the ordinances of the city in relation to the Taxes.
1. All persons who pay their taxes on or before the first of July, shall be entitled to a deduction of 5 per cent. upon their respective bills.
2. That from and after the first day of November, it shall be the duty of the collector to enforce the payment of all taxes remaining unpaid, by distress or otherwise.
3. All taxes remaining unpaid after the first of January shall be charged a penalty of one half per cent. a month upon the amount thereof.
