Among the ma- h ny moral admonitions given by the master poet, Shakspeare, there is none which should be more | strictly observed than that which we have just quoted; and yet, perhaps, there are few injunctions less scrupulously complied with. The selfish man can scarcely reconcile it to his interests to deal justly in all respects with others, and yet he is quick to discover and to resent the slightest deviation from this great moral principle when practiced against himself. The greedy monopolist, whether in ordinary trade, or in the more liberal profession of publishing a newspaper, sees in every competitor an enemy, whom his avarice would induce him to destroy; regardless of the obligation to be just, or the Divine command to "do unto others as you would that others should do unto you;" and hence every artifice is resorted to, and all the baser passions brought into active operation, to accomplish the object in view. With such men honorable competition constitutes guilt, and the degree of criminality is increased with the successful progress of the competitor. It is not enough with those who are actuated by these mean and sordid feelings, that they are themselves liberally supported by the public, but they repine at the prosperity of others, and endearor to deprive their neighbors of a loaf which they cannot cat themselver. It is the "dog in . the manger" principle upon which they act-but they forget that retributive justice never fails to overtake the violator of right.

"Shadows, clouds and darkness" may obscure his path, and present impediments to his progress; but these obstacles will prove but temporary.
