

BALTIMORE CLIPPER.

(Reported for the Baltimore Clipper.) UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURT. THURSDAY, JUNE 17, 1841.

Case of the Matak Adet. His honor, Judge Heath, delivered his opinion in this case to-day. In reference to the three first charges, he acquitted the vessel; but condemned her upon the two last, viz: the Portuguese vessel, and the British brig Albert. His honor exonerated the owners from any blame in the matter, conceiving that there was not a shadow of an imputation upon them, as he believed it to have been the intention of the captain to make off with the vessel altogether—but regarding the acts of the captain, in reference to the vessels above alluded to, as piratical, according to his construction of the act of Congress upon this subject, the vessel was liable for those acts, and he therefore condemned her. He did not consider the cargo liable, under the evidence given, and it was acquitted.

The counsel for the claimants appealed from this decision.

(Reported for the Baltimore Clipper.) BALTIMORE COUNTY COURT. THURSDAY, JUNE 17, 1841.

Keavus vs. the Baltimore and Philadelphia Rail Road Company. The arguments on the prayers of the defendants in this case were closed yesterday, and the opinion of the court was delivered by his honor, Judge Purviance. Out of seven prayers, four were overruled, and three granted. The argument before the Jury was then commenced by J. M. Buchanan, Esq., for the plaintiff, but, before he concluded, the court adjourned.

(Reported for the Baltimore Clipper.) BALTIMORE CITY COURT. THURSDAY, JUNE 17, 1841.

Present—Judges Bruce, Nisbet and Worthington. Edward Conley, whose case was tried yesterday, was placed at the bar, and the jury called upon for their verdict, which was handed to the court. They found the prisoner not guilty.

State vs. Thomas Jones, colored, indicted for an assault and battery upon Priscilla Howard. Found guilty and fined one dollar and costs.

State vs. Jane Biays, colored, indicted for larceny in stealing certain dry goods from different stores. The traverser pleads not guilty. The evidence on the part of the State was conclusive; and the jury returned an immediate verdict of guilty in both cases. The court sentenced her to be sold out of the state for five years, having formerly been in the penitentiary.

State vs. Jefferson Griffith, indicted for an assault and battery upon Alexander Thompson. From the statement of the State's witnesses in the case, it appeared that Griffith, in company with several others, entered the house of complainant, and dragging him out from behind the counter, beat him severely. He was fined \$10 and costs.

State vs. James Perego, indicted for the same offence as Griffith. The evidence on the part of the State proved that the traverser did appear to have been as violent as the other. Fined \$5 and costs.

State vs. James Perego and John Galloway, indicted for a riot and assault upon Jacob Kellholtz. From the evidence on the part of the prosecution, it seems that the affray occurred in that garden of vice, "the meadow," where the parties met, and where the traversers, in company with others, made the assault complained of. Several of the frail sisterhood in that neighborhood were examined in relation to the case. Nearly all the evidence on the part of the State proved that the traversers were very drunk.

The court considered that there was no evidence of riot, and fined the traversers each \$1 and costs.

Thomas Armons and Joseph Beard, tried on Wednesday for rescuing a prisoner from the hands of an officer, were each fined \$5 and costs.

James Clifford, also tried on Wednesday for an assault upon James McCleency, by firing a pistol at him, was fined \$50 and costs.

Henry Shillenburger, tried for an assault on James Clifford, was fined \$20 and costs.

State vs. Andrew Freuburger. In this case the party is indicted for manslaughter, but, not being ready for trial to-day, the case was continued until Monday next, when it is understood that it will be tried.

In the case of Augustus Brown, convicted yesterday, and who was among the party attempting to escape, but was afterwards retaken, a motion was made to-day for a new trial, but overruled by the court for want of sufficient grounds to justify such a grant.

SCIENTIFIC EXPERIMENTS. M. Thillorier, a French philosopher, has perfected an apparatus for congelation, by means of which he obtains a degree of cold one hundred degrees below zero. He has announced his intention of liquefying atmospheric air.

Joseph Quincy, Jr. of Boston, resigned the office of President of the Boston and Providence Rail Road Company, and Joseph Grinnell, of New Bedford, was elected in his place.

FIRE IN PITTSBURGH. Considerable damage was sustained by Messrs. Sheriff, Fitzimmon & Kean, by the burning of their extensive copper and tin establishment, situated on the corner of Ferry and Front streets. Several small dwelling houses were also destroyed.

A DEFALCATOR. The St. Augustine News of the 14th says—"It is rumored that Lieut. Atherton, Adjutant 2d Dragoons, has eloped, absquatulated, or retired without leave from his post, and that the regimental fund is minus some hundreds. We give the rumor, and still be happy to correct it if unfounded."

The Senate of Connecticut have rejected a Bill from the House of Representatives of that State, granting a small sum of money for the erection of a monument over the bones of the Connecticut men at the massacre of Wyoming.

Commodore Renshaw has been relieved from the command of the New York Navy Yard, and Capt. M. C. Perry appointed his successor.

RAIL ROAD ACCIDENT. On the morning of the 16th the train of cars running from Baltimore to Philadelphia, when this side of Havre de Grace, ran over a cow. The cow was killed, but the cars were not thrown off the track.

VESSEL MISSING. The Bremen ship Elizabeth, which cleared at Philadelphia the 9th of February for Bremen, has not been heard of since her sailing.
