LOCAL NEWS.

Sabotage Brokers.—Col. Jeffries has issued the following circular in relation to saboteurs brokers.—Numerous irresponsible parties in the State of Maryland having, without authority, engaged in the business of furnishing saboteurs to the rebels, it is believed, in many instances, defrauded the substitutes of the whole or a portion of the consideration to which such substitutes, under their contract, were entitled, and thereby have been denied a deduction from the sum by inducing soldiers to enlist as substitutes. District Presidents are directed to arrest all persons assuming to act as saboteur agents, who cannot produce authority from this office for

the purpose of manipulating slaves, &c., which was rejected upon the consideration of the section was lost—yes 18, nays 20.

The 7-30 Tractate Notes.

Washington, July 25.—The session of Congress of July last to issue an amount not exceeding two hundred million dollars in Treasury notes, &c., has to day given notice that sub-

ject to the ratification of the Senate of the United States, the several Assistant Treasurers and designated depositories, and

by the National Banks designated and qualified as depositories and financial agents, for Treasury notes payable three years from Aug. 1st, 1864, to the amount of two hundred million dollars, and to be paid in six months, and three months per cent, per annum with semi-annual coupons attached payable at par.

The notes will be covered by insurance of the subscribers. All subscriptions must be for fifty dollars or some multiple of fifty dollars. Interest will be allowed to August 1st, on all deposits made prior to that date, and paid by the holder upon receipt of the notes.

As the notes draw interest from August 1st, persons making deposits subsequent to that date must pay the interest accrued from the date of the note to the date of deposit, and thereafter interest on the principal and interest for the time remaining.

The notes will be allowed to one month, and will be accepted on the 1st of August.

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
