From Petersburg. THE OCCUPATION OF HAGERSTOWN CONFIRMED. Hagerstown, Aug. 5.—The occupation of Hagerstown is confirmed by official dispatches.

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From the Southwest. A Cavalry Raid on the Macon Railroad. Eighteen miles of the Railroad destroyed—Capture and Destruction of 200 Wagons from Atlanta—General Sherman's Advance.
