THE PEACE PARTY.—The recent meeting of Colorado Jewett, George Sanders, and the rebel congressmen, at Niagara Falls, professedly upon a peace mission, is being treated upon by the "peace" as well as the War Democrats, as they call themselves, to mark political capital for the Presidential campaign.

I doubt whether the pit it fell is more infernal in the spirit which now prompts the rebels in their attempt to destroy the government of their fathers. We proceeded on our journey under simply the flag of our commission, and on the morning of the 11th we landed at the Landing, and just midway between two of the gunboats which picked the river. A friend sitting with me in the box of the boat remarked that if we were under the light of the rebel fire, for just all of us sat the whole company, the ladies occupying a prominent position.

Almost simultaneously with the first shot on board the company could comprehend what was the trouble, four other shots were fired, which took effect—one on the person of William Wilson, of Jersey City, who was shot through the back, the ball penetrating the bladder. It is now in the hands of a physician, who says he cannot recover.

The deck of the boat was literally covered with blood; it was indeed a sickening sight to those who are all used to similar scenes, though under very dissimilar circumstances. All the persons fired upon daily feed and bind up the wounds of the friends of the Confederates. There cannot be the least excess considered in mitigation of the atrocity of the deed.

The rebels know our flag and our mission, and so well known to our badge that one or perhaps more of the others have availed themselves of its use to spy out our work, and "Success" papers have printed the cleverness of the act. At Fort Royal and other places I treated their sick and wounded as tenderly as I did our own, and the same as the war spirit has actuated every member of this commission as far as is known at headquarters.

THE ATTACK ON THE JOHN BROOKS. (Continued.) The Government has established a policy upon the subject, which has never been departed from since the first blow was struck at Sumter—that is, not to acknowledge the leaders of the accused rebellion as a government, and to require of all who would wish to retire from the rebellion against their country, to lay down their arms, and return to their homes in peace.
