COPPERHEADS RAPIDLY GETTING AT A DISCOUNT.

There is no mistake about the fact, that the queer mission to Richmond of an honest and enthusiastic religionist—we use the term in no invidious sense—has proved a terrible blow to the cheating and treacherous gang of the loyal States, who to worm themselves into power are vociferating for "peace!"

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To Be Sent North of the Ohio River.

Eighty-seven deserters from the rebel army and fifty-one disloyal citizens from Georgia, Tennessee, and Alabama, were received in this city yesterday from the front.

A man named Eshelman has been arrested in Gettysburg for hiring a horse in Lancaster and neglecting to return it. The prisoner, it appears, graduated at Franklin and Marshall College a few years ago, studied for and entered the ministry. When arrested in Gettysburg he was in the act of preparing an introductory sermon for the charge to which he had been appointed.

In Brooklyn, two years ago, there was an estimated surplus of 2500 horses, while now the supply is believed to be 2000 short. This is attributable, in part, to the influx of population from the Border States, consequent upon political disturbances. Rents, generally, are ten to fifteen per cent higher than they were last spring.

New York and places east are coming down considerably in the price of horses, paying only two hundred dollars locally for one year ago.
