And how long, for how many records of years or centuries this eystem so ruinous in its workings might have continued had it not invited its own destruction, none can tell. Sabtle, able, with leieure to plan its own security, blavery had hedged itself around with berriers which only the earthquake o revolution could overturn and destroy. Bleadly displacing white labor, skilfal, enlightened, educated labor, with that which could be considered scarcely above barbarian, because ciude, limited, incapable of actieving much progress, it hald its landed dominion as with an iron grasp, it fairly monopolized the whole region originally surrendered to it rule. Bringing desolution more or less to the most fertile pertions of the State, it reached out beyond its own immediate sphere, it stigmatized labor as a badge of servility, its tendency was to crush cut all independence of both thought and action in the masses, the masses, always to be dependent upon culti-

vated industry for the means of support. Rightly considered. what was this system Calvert, is the Agent. of holding large estates, "mazors" in Maryland but a distant appreach to the English system, which creating and fostering a "landed aristocracy," makes the possession of great estates the test of social standing? What man having the spirit of a man could telerate with patience the patronizing airs of a neighbor, not one whit above himself in the eyo of the Constitution of the United States, yet by State lawe, made enteervient, held in thrall, scarcely permitted to speak above his breath of a system and of abores which were bearing heavily upon himself, and which either prevented his children from rising at home or drove them forth in anger and disgust to other and more liberal commonwealths to find the

means of bettering their condition? Let the workingmen of the State take note that forever, if they are true to themselves, they are relieved from this bar upon their advance, this ban upon their national rights and privileges; that it is their invaluable right to fix their own future destiny by voting for that instrument, which at last recognizes the true standing of every citizen, and the real needs of the State.

Let it be remembered that one of the daydreams of the cotton oligarchy, the men who for their own ambitions purposes set on foot this attempt at revolution, was to establish hereditary aristocracy beecd upon the posses tion of land, -of great estates. Their great oracle De Bow had provided for this as a part of the programme as early as February, 1861 when he said-speaking of the "Confederate Constitution" expected to be formed:
