WAR DEPARTMENT, WASHINGTON, Oct. 8-12 o'clock .- Major General Dix, New York: This Department has received the following reports of the enemy's assault josterday upon General Butler's line, their subsequent repuise and General Birney's brilliant action, driving the enemy to their inner line of en-

trenchments around Richmond. Headquarters Department of Virginia and North Carolina, 6 30 P. M., Oct. 7th, 1884.— Lieut. Gen. U. S. Grant: -At 6 30 A. The enemy then swept down the entrenchments towards General Birney, who having thrown back his right, walted their assault and repulsed it with very heavy loss on the secure. part of the enemy. The esemy in the meantime airanced toward New Market, but were met by a force at the signal tower.

At 3 P. M. I took the offersive, sending Gen'i Birney with two divisions up the Darbytown road. The enemy has retreated as he advanced, and Birney has reached and occupied the entrenchments which the energy took from Kautz and were fortifying for themselves. Our loss has been small—not l one-eighth of the enemy's. We have about B. F. BUILER, 100 prisoners.
