No one doubts that if it be thrown out, the Constitution will be defeated. No greater crime, therefore, can be committed, ban by disobeging the law which makes it the duty of the Judges to administer that oath in its very words to every voter, and to certaly that it has been taken by every voter. The object of this refusal to require that oath, to secure the votes of disloyal men for Mr

To effect this, Mr. Chapman is endeavoring to get the Judges of Election to have two bailotboxes—one for the voters on the Constitution, and one for the ballots for Mayor But this is flagrantly illegal; for the law authorizes only one ballot-box for the received and one for the rejected ballots. In the next place the name of Mr. Stirling will

be printed on the same ticket with the vote for the Constitution. How can those ballots be distributed between the ballot boxes. If they are put into the Mayoralty box, then they must be lost to the new Constitution; for there will be no possibility of certifying that all the voters took the oath in the Constitution, unless it be administered to all whose ballots are put into the Mayoralty box. So that it one retcon be permitted to vote for Mayor, without toking the oath, every ballot for the Constitution,

and Mayor, in that box, must be rejected by the Nor is the difficulty avoided by the Judge ask. ing the voter whether he votes on the constitution; for the Judge has no legal right to inquire into the contents of any ballot, any more than he has a right to open any ballot. The voter has a right to keep his own secret on the question whether he voted at all on the Constitution or at all on the Mayoralty, or on any city officer, and no distribution of the ballois can be made between the two boxes without violating the right

of the voter. Nay, more, the declaration of the voter is no ground on which the Judge has a right to act; for he has a right to his secret and may see fit to answer untruly, as he has a right to refuse to answer

at all an illegal question. It is then plain that two ballot hoxes are no! legal; that they can answer no honest purpose that the discrimination attempted is impossible without violating the secresy of the ballot; and that if the oath be not administered to att who vote either, ballets for the Constitution and Mayor put into the Mayoral:y box must be het to the Constitution, or votes against the Constitution and for Mayor, must be falsely counted and

falsely certified against the Constitution Thus legal votes be thus lost for the Constitu ian, or illegal votes against it, must be falsely certified if there be any attempt to hold two elections; when the law provides for only one, such conduct is a great crime crime against the people such a crime deserves and will receive con-

dign punishment. Such a dereliction of duty is an indictable crime, punishable under the election law of the State and the Constitution, has in Baltimore city friends enough to see that such a crime should not go unnunished. If any Judge retuse or fall to require that oath, he will assuredly be presented before the Grand Jury of the Criminal Court of Baltimore City,

and that body will obey their oath and indict every Judge who is found derelict in his duty. Gantlemen will be placed at each Precinct whose duty it will be to watch the conduct of each Judge, and take a note of the names of every Judge who admits any vote without requiring the cath prescribed by the Constitution, and of every person who votes without taking that oath, and the name of that Judge and voter will be handed to the Grand Jury for indictment under the law of the state. If Judges wish a peaceable time at the election,

and do not wish to have to defend an indictment after the election, they must obey the order of
