Our Cavalry Victory in the Valley

All Quiet with Generals Grant
and Sherman.

Official Bulletin.

WAR DEPARTMENT, Oct. 12, 8:40 P. M.—Major General Dix, New York:—Despatches have been received from Gen. Grant, Sherman and Sheridan, but no military movements since my last telegrams are reported.

The following details of the cavalry engagement last Sunday, are furnished by General Sheridan:

"I have seen no sign of the enemy since the brilliant engagement of the 9th instant. It was a square cavalry fight, in which the enemy was routed beyond my power to describe. Almost everything carried on wheels except one piece of artillery, and when last seen it was passing over Rude's Hill, near New Market, on the Kernan road, 25 miles from the battle field, to which point the pursuit was kept up.

The battery, men and horses, etc., were captured. The horses were all in good condition, but were all exchanged by our cavalry men for their broken down animals. The casualties in the 6th will not exceed sixty men. The one hundred men of the 8th Ohio dispersed while guarding the bridge over the North Shenandoah have come in, except the officers." Edwin M. From the Army of the Potomac.

HQQUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTOMAC, Oct. 10th, P. M.—No events of importance have transpired in front of Petersburg for several days.

The pickets have been actively engaged on another for two or three nights on the left, and left centre of the line, and a number of casualties occur daily.

Dr. Howard, of the regular army, has recently introduced valuable improvements in the ambulances, which will prove great blessing to the wounded.

Gens. Grant, Meade and Warren, as well as the principal surgeons in the army, highly recommend it, and there is no doubt it will be introduced extensively into the armories of the United States.

Oct. 11.—A. M.—Last evening and part of the night firing was kept in the centre of the line, in front of Petersburg. Large bodies of the enemy's troops have been seen moving towards our left for the past 24 hours, and they have received the attention of our gunners wherever they appeared within range. There is nothing new from the James River Army, which remains in its former position at Chapin's Bluff. The enemy do not seem desirous of attacking them again.

PENNSYLVANIA ELECTION.

PENNSYLVANIA, Oct. 12.—The Democratic State Committee has received a despatch giving a gain of 500 for the Democratic ticket in Lancaster county, the Union vote being 800. The Democrats claim a majority of 6,000 in this home vote, but the account of gains and losses from the returns thus far received show only a Democratic gain of 4,650, whilst the majority to be overcome is over 15,000. The Agre claims a majority of 6,000 in the home vote, which would be a gain of 20,000.

Lycoming county reported 500 Democratic majority; a Union loss of 650, soldiers' vote.

General Butler's Headquarters, October 11—8:15 P. M.—The voting in the army to day among the Pennsylvania troops has passed off very quietly, and so far as can be learned at this hour, the Union ticket has been every where successful.

At the headquarters of this Army to-day, in Captain Watson's Company of Pennsylvania Artillery, cut of 50 votes cast for members of Congress from the city of Philadelphia, only 17 votes were cast for the Democratic ticket.

Pennsylvania, Oct. 12.—The Chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee claims from the returns received by him from 34 counties, a Democratic gain of 12,715. The statement of the Republican State Committee has not been obtained, but it is momentarily expected. The best political authorities are in doubt as to the result, but estimate a majority of about 9,000 either side in the home vote.

Harrisburg, Oct. 12.—The general opinion here is that the State has gone Democratic on the home vote by from three to four thousand. The soldier's vote will give from ten to fifteen thousand majority for the Union ticket. The Commissioners to the Shenandoah Valley have returned. They report that they were unable to reach Sheridan's army.

Schenk's Hill council will give strong from 1,000 to 1,725 majority—a Union gain of 316.

Philadelphia, October 12, 2:30 P. M.—The Union men now claim a majority in the State of from 2,000 to 6,000 on the home vote. This is based on information received at the Republican headquarters.

A special dispatch to the Evening Telegraph, dated Harrisburg, October 12th, says: From Hagerstown, Twp., Bradford, Potter and a row.

McKeon counties, we have reports of considerable Union gains. Hagerstown gives 1,302 Union majority—a gain of over 100 on Curtis's majority.

Bradford county, with over ten townships to bear from, gives over 3,000 Union majority, which gives a total of 2,782 Union majority. It is believed that we have carried the State by at least 20,000 majority, with the soldiers' vote. We have certainly elected 16 Congressmen, a gain of 4. The Legislature is largely Union.

In the 5th District, Mr. Thayer, Union, is re-elected to Congress by a small majority.

Berks county, with 13 townships to bear from, gives Anconia, Democrat, 4,777 majority. The Democratic majority will probably be about 6,227, a Union gain of 355.

LATEST.

Philadelphia, Oct. 12—11 A. M.—From the returns received up to this hour, the editor of Fornay's Press claims a Union majority of 3,000 to 5,000, although they say it is probable it will be reduced; from the appearance of the soldier's vote a gain of three members in the Congressional delegation is considered probable. The Agre estimates from returns received by them from 41 counties a Democratic gain of 13,000. Twenty-five counties are yet to hear from.

SOLDIER'S VOTE.

Washington, Oct. 12.—The vote of the Pennsylvania soldiers in Washington and vicinity, including Alexandria, is as follows: Union, 1,309; Democratic 212.

The Ohio soldiers voted Union 126; Democratic 32.

The estimate of the Union State Committee and the North American, are that the State has been carried by the Union party by a majority of 6,000 on the home vote. The Legislature is also largely Union.

INDIANA.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 12.—Returns from thirty-one counties, partially official, show an aggregate Union majority of 23,000, a net gain Union gain of over 19,000 over the vote of 1862, which gave a Democratic majority in the State of over 16,000. From present indications, the Congressional delegation is 21 Union and 2 Democratic, with the 7th (Voorhees) District doubtful.

Indianapolis (official) gives 6,567 Union majority.

Indianapolis, October 12.—Returns from 45 counties show a Union majority of over 20,000. The balance of the State yet to hear from will increase the majority probably 6,000. There is a small Union majority in both branches of the Legislature. The Congressional delegation is all Union, except the 1st, 2d and 7th. The 1st and 7th are doubtful, and claimed by both parties.

OHIO.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 12.—Ohio voted sixteen Union Congressional Representatives—probably 17—a gain of 12 members.

FROM MEXICO.

New York, Oct. 12.—The steamer *Laguna*, from Havasu on the 8th, has arrived, with City of Mexico dates to the 20th.

It was stated that Juarez had addressed in full of Ortega.

Pierre Soule had arrived at Vera Cruz. Just as the steamer left Vera Cruz it was reported that Maximilian had been assassinated, but the report was not believed.

There is but little fever in Havana harbor.

The Missing Steamer *Eagle*.—New York, Oct. 12.—By the steamer *Eagle*, that left Havana on the 8th inst., we have no intelligence of the missing steamer *Kanawha*. The presumption among the officers of the *Eagle* is that she has been captured by rebels.

THE NATIONAL LOAN.

Washington, October 12th.—The subscriptions to the 7.30 loan for the last two days, as reported to the Treasury Department, amount to \$559,000.

A SIGNIFICANT REBEL LETTER.—I enclose a rebel letter, says a Herald correspondent, which the writer was compelled to leave unfinished upon the approach of our forces. It shows the state of feeling among the greater part of the men comprising the rebel army at present time:

On a Farm, September 23, 1864.—My Dear Sirs—

I hope you will excuse me for not replying to your last letter sooner. We have been expecting to get home every day, was the case of it; but I understand, since General Kirby was defeated, that all roads will be stopped for us.
