PROPOSALS FOR FLOUR.

OFFICE DEPOT COMMISSARY OF SUPPLIES, WASHINGTON, D. C., October 21, 1861.

SEALED PROPOSALS, in duplicate, are invited until November 1st, 1861, for furnishing the Subsistence Department with **TWO THOUSAND (2000) BARRELS OF FLOUR**.

The proposal will state for what is known at this Depot as Nos. 1, 2 and 3, and bids will be entered for any quantity less than the whole.

Bids must be in duplicate, and for each grade on separate sheets of paper.

The time of commencing to commence with in five days from the opening of the bids, and is such quantities, daily, as the Government may direct, delivered at the Government warehouse direct, at the Government warehouse direct, or at the Government warehouse of railroad depot in Washington, D. C.

The delivery of all flour awarded to be completed within twenty days from the opening of the bids.

Payment will be made in certificates of indebtedness, or such other funds as the Government may have for disbursement.

The person naming the section will be made just before the flour is received, and none will be accepted which is not fresh ground, and made from wheat grown in the vicinity where manufactured, unless of a very unusual quality.

The flour to be delivered in new, oak barrels, head 1-peck.

An oath of allegiance must accompany the bid of each bidder who has not the oath on file in this office, and no bid will be entertained from parties who have previously failed with their bid, or from bidders not present to respond.

The Government reserves the right to reject, and to return, any bid, or to award the contract to the lowest bidder at 22d street, endorsed, "Proposals for Flour."

PROPOSALS FOR RATIONS.

QUARTERMASTER'S OFFICE, U. S. B. CO., WASHINGTON, D. C., October 21, 1861.

SEALED PROPOSALS will be received at this office, until 12 o'clock P. M. of the 23d day of November next, for furnishing rations to the United States Army, at the following stations, for the year 1862:

Portsmouth, New Hampshire;

Charlestown, Massachusetts;

Philadelphie, Pennsylvania;

Washington City, District of Columbia;

Garrison, near Norfolk, Virginia;

A certain quantity of each of the following articles will be required, to be delivered at the rate of one-half pound per man, and half pound per horse, per day, in ten pounds of rice, or, in like manner, twice per week, one hundred and fifty ounces of desicated potatoes, and one hundred and forty-five pounds of flour, or, two hundred and forty-five pounds of salt beef; eighteen ounces of dried or four, or twelve ounces of hard bread, or one and a fourth pound of corn meal; and at the rate of one-half pound per man, and half pound per horse, in ten pounds of rice, or, in like manner, twice per week, one hundred and fifty ounces of desicated potatoes, and one hundred and forty-five pounds of flour, or, two hundred and forty-five pounds of salt beef; eighteen ounces of dried or four, or twelve ounces of hard bread, or one and a fourth pound of corn meal; and at the rate of one-half pound per man, and half pound per horse, in ten pounds of sugar; four quarts of vinegar; one pound of spermaceti candles, or one and one-fourth pound of adenamine candles; one quart of oil of turpentine; four pounds of soap; and two quarts of salts.

The ratios to be delivered upon the order of the Commanding Officer of each station; the field officer, either in writing or by word of mouth, with an equal proportion of the fore and hind quarters, necks and kidneys, follow excluded, the park, No. 1, prime mors pork; the shank, extra mors, the come good rib; the shoulder, mors, the rump, or its equivalent; and the beans, vinegar, candles, soap, oil, &c., to be of good quality.
