The Democratic Meeting Last Night.—The Democratic meeting last night at the corner of the Clipper Office, the following exhibit of our regular rates will be found of service:

When we entered the hall, the meeting was being organized, but we could not obtain the names of the officers selected to preside over its deliberations. A series of resolutions were submitted and put to vote, and upon the negative vote being taken, three cheers were proposed and given for Lincoln.

At this point a slight disturbance arose, but it was quickly quieted. Albert Ritchie, formerly a lawyer of this city, after the confanon had subsided, was introduced and began to address the assembly. He had spoken but a few moments when an individual on the platform pronounced the name of Lincoln as a vulgar name and endeavored to assault the speaker.

The belligerents fought and ran towards the main entrance, and several persons upon the sidewalk were arrested. The police officers were powerless to act in the premises, and in three instances the officers were roughly handled. It is regretted by every lover of peace that a disturbance of this kind should have happened.

The result of last night's work will in all probability prevent the holding of another McMillan mass meeting in Baltimore during the present campaign.

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FINANCIAL.—The New York Evening Post says: Break-down in the gold speculation this morning, while it has depressed business at the stock exchange, and checked further speculative upward movements of the fancy stocks, has caused a general decline in all kinds of securities except Government.

The loan market is more active, but the supply of capital seeking investment is so small that it is difficult to find loans at 7 per cent. From various causes there has been, however, some change of loans than usual this morning.

The currency of the new national bank amounts to \$25,750,000. The currency of the State banks is estimated at about \$170,000,000, the entire mass of currency of the United States is more than \$200,000,000.

The receipts from Internal Revenue for the fiscal year, reach \$100,000,000, and the Custom receipts amount to \$107,000,000. Among the Internal Revenue returns \$30,000,000 have been derived from the tax upon spirits and wine and liquor.

The receipts from the tax upon spirits and wine and liquor, amount to \$10,000,000, and the receipts from leather are about the same as from iron, about four millions five hundred thousand dollars.
