SEALD PROPOSALS will be received at this office, until 2 P.M. on the 21st day of November next, for furnishing rations to the United States Marines, at the following stations, for the year 1864, viz:

Fort Monroe, Hampshire;

Charlestown, Massachusetts;

Brooklyn, New York;

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania;

Washington, District of Columbia;

Garrison, New York;

Each ration to consist of three-fourths of a pound of fresh or bacon, one and a fourth pound of flour or salt beef; eighteen ounces of bread or biscuits, one and a half pounds of sugar, one fourth pound of corn meal; and at the rate of one hundred rations of eight quarts of beans; or, in lieu thereof, ten pounds of rice; or, in lieu thereof, ten pounds of peas; one hundred and fifty ounces of dried pease; one hundred and fifty ounces of dried beans; one hundred and fifty ounces of mixed vegetables; ten pounds of coffee; or, in lieu thereof, one and a half pound of tea; fifteen ounces of sugar; four quarts of vinegar; one quart of pickles; one quart of oil; one fourth pound of hammarlund's rancid; one and a half pound of flour; four pounds of soap, and two quarts of salt.

The rations will be delivered upon the order of the Commanding Officer of each station; the fresh beef either in bulk or by the single ration, or good quality, with an equal proportion of the fore and hind quarters, necks and kidneys, taken out of the carcass; the salt beef in bulk; the flour, either superfine; the coffee good; the sugar, good; New Orleans or its equivalent; and the beans, vinegar, codlins, soap, salt, &c., to be supplied.

All articles to be delivered upon the order of the Commanding Officer of each station; the fresh beef either in bulk or by the single ration, or good quality, with an equal proportion of the fore and hind quarters, necks and kidneys, taken out of the carcass; the salt beef in bulk; the flour, either superfine; the coffee good; the sugar, good; New Orleans or its equivalent; and the beans, vinegar, codlins, soap, salt, &c., to be supplied.

All bids must be accompanied by the following guarantee:
