PROPOSALS FOR CORN MEAL.

OFFICE DEPOT COMMISSARY OF SUBSISTENCE, WASHINGTON, D. C., November 12, 1861.

Sealed proposals are invited until the 19th inst., at 12 M. of the day following the United States Subsistence Department, with the sum of THREE HUNDRED (300) BARRELS OF CORN MEAL.

to be delivered at the Government Warehouse in Georgetown, or at the wharves of the Subsistence Depot in Washington, D. C., at such time as the Government may direct, after five days' notice.

The Corn Meal to be delivered in good, sound, firm ground, each barrel containing one hundred and fifty (150) pounds; to be fresh ground, and of good, merchantable quality, and will be inspected just before it is received.

The payment is made to the Government, which may have for disbursement.

Bids will be received for the delivery of FIFTY THOUSAND (50,000) POUNDS OF COIN IN THE FAR, in the bags, in two bushels each, upwards. Bidders will state the time when deliveries will be commenced, and when they will be completed.

All the articles offered will be subject to a rigid inspection on the part of the government before being accepted.

The Librarian reserves the right to reject any article which may not be equal to the sample sent.

Persons furnishing samples must not expect payment for their return. All samples must be delivered at the State Library free of charge.

No proposal will be considered unless the bidder is personally known to the Librarian to be a person of good character, and of sufficient means to meet his obligations, or vouchers from responsible local men accompanying the bids, that the bidders have been loyal since the commencement of the rebellion.

PROPOSALS FOR RATIONS.

QUARTERMASTER'S OFFICE, U. S. MILITARY, WASHINGTON, 21st October, 1861.

SEALED PROPOSALS will be received at this office, until 12 o'clock P. M. of the 25th day of November, 1861, for furnishing rations to the United States Marines, at the following stations, for the year 1862, viz:

Portsmouth, New Hampshire;
Providence, Rhode Island;

Brooklyn, New York;

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania;

Washington City, District of Columbia;

Garrison, New York;

Each ration consists of one-fourth of a pound of pork or bacon, one and a fourth pound of fresh or salt beef, eighteen ounces of bread or flour, or two-fourth of a pound of bread, or one and a fourth pound of rice, or beans, at the rate of one hundred and ten rations of eight quarts each, in lieu thereof, ten pounds of rice, or, in lieu thereof, twice per week, one hundred and fifteen ounces of dried vegetables, potatoes, and one hundred and fifteen ounces of dried fruits, or, in lieu thereof, one and a half pound of tea; fifteen pounds of sugar; four quarts of vinegar; one pound of spermaceti candles, or one and one-fourth pounds of tallow candles, or one and a half pound of tallow; four pounds of soap, and two quarts of salt.

The rations to be delivered upon the order of the Quartermaster General of each station; the fresh beef, either in bulk, or by choice, of good quality, with an equal proportion of the fore and hind quarters, and kidneys, following excluded; the pork, no. 3, prime meat; pork, the best part of the shoulder, fat, lean, and bacon; the sugar, good New Orleans; its equivalent; and the beans, vinegar, candles, soap, salt, etc., to be of good quality.

The rations to be packed in boxes, and to be packed to inspect.

All bids must be accompanied by the following guarantee:
