PROPOSALS FOR CORN MEAL.

Sealed proposals are invited until the 19th inst., at 12 o'clock M., for furnishing the United States Subsistence Department with
THREE HUNDRED (300) BARRELS OF CORN MEAL.

To be delivered at the Government Warehouse in Georgetown, on the 1st of December, 1861, at the Depot in Washington, D. C., at such time as the Government may direct, after five days' notice.

The Corn Meal to be delivered in bags, sound, clean, and dry, each bag containing one hundred and sixty-six (166) pounds, to be free from dust and mold, must have quality, and will be inspected just before it is received.

The amount of funds as the Government may have for distribution will be indicated to be addressed to the undersigned, at No. 243 "C" street, endorsed, "Proposals for Corn Meal."

SEALED PROPOSALS, in duplicate, will be received at this office until 12 M. on SATURDAY November 19th, 1861, for furnishing the United States Subsistence Department with
4,000 HEAD OF SWINE AND 500 CATTLE.

Each animal to be delivered in the condition of the Cattle Scales at Baltimore, Md., in lots of (1,000) one thousand each every (10) ten days; to be packed within one and a half days after arrival, at the place of delivery, and to be in good condition, weight about (1,000) thirteen hundred pounds gross each, all falling short of (1,000) one thousand and fifty pounds to be free from dust and mold, must have quality, and will be inspected just before it is received.

A deduction of ten (10) pounds will be made from the weight of each steer accepted; and if the animal packed is not the animal named, or stands in the present two thousand dollars before being weighed, it is not weighed immediately after removal from the scales.

Blank forms for proposals can be had on application to this office, either in person, by mail, or telegraph.

Proposals by telegraph, or other irregular, informal proposals, will not be considered.

All proposals will be subject to a rigid inspection on the part of the Government before being accepted.

Proposals must be on blank forms, which are anathema of all parties offering proposals will be required, if it has not already been filed in this office.

The Government reserves to itself the right to reject any or all bids considered unreasonable.

Proposals for corn, such delivery in such funds as may be on hand, payment will be made as soon as funds are received.

Proposals must be endorsed, "Proposed for Subsistence Department," and forwarded.

All proposals received under this specification will be opened and examined on this day of TUESDAY and FRIDAY of each week, at 12 M.
