A "HANDY" MAP. Nashville lies in a bend or curve of the Cumberland river, the right bank tending toward the North. Ten turnpikes diverge from the city, almost exactly as the fingers ' point, when, placing one's hand side by side (with the palms upward,) one extends them as widely as possible. The wrists stant the left hand is the Lebanon pike, running long the river nearly parallel with it; the forefinger is the Murfreesborough pike; the middle finger, the Nolansville pike (between which the Chattanooga Railroad) runs;) the ring finger, the Franklin pike; the little finger is the Granny White pike. The little finger of the right hand is the Hillsborough pike; the ring finger, the Harding pike; the middle finger, the Char.
