I can scarcely give a description of these works. They are certainly the most formidable and best built earthworks I ever saw, and do credit to the engineer who planned them.

One would suppose that the whole Southern Confederacy had been at work threwing up mud and sand, and General Whiting, the Engineer, certainly had an abiding faith in the durability of the Confederacy, as he shows his opinion by his works, which have been four years building, but were taken in as many days.

Fort Caswell is the same shape that it was before it fell into rebel hands, only they have covered the masonry with earth on the outside, and made it almost imperwious to shot and shell. It is in many res pects stronger than Fort Fisher, and harder to take by assault, still it could be taken and the rebe's knew it. Three or four gunboats at the outside would have started them cut.
